**Sense of Place and Sense of Planet** Jan 02 2021 *Sense of Place and Sense of Planet* analyzes the relationship between the imagination of the global and the ethical commitment to the local in environmentalist thought and writing from the 1960s to the present. In humans it occupies only 10% of the brain volume, yet has approximately 69 billion neurons; that is 80% of the nerve cells in the brain.
